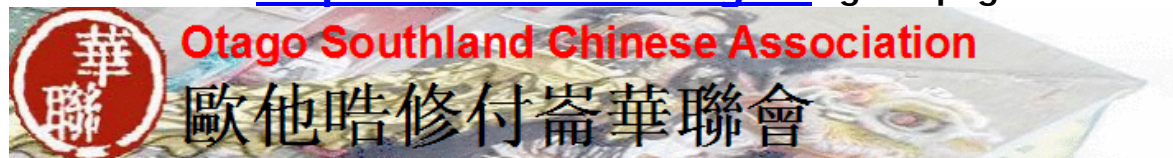

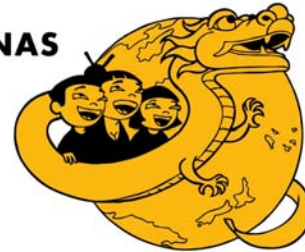

You must be a member of the Otago & Southland Chinese Association to be able to play.

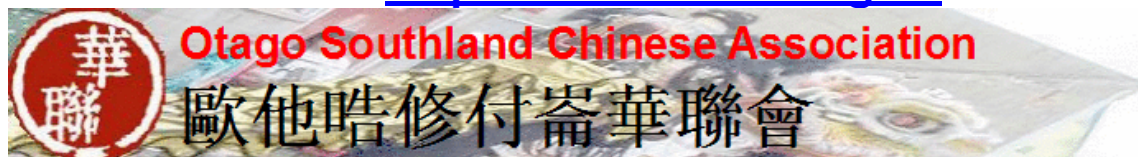
Payment entitles you to

The Ventnor

The Ventnor, chartered by the Cheong Shing Tong, left Wellington in October 1902 with just under five hundred coffins on board. Sadly the boat struck a submerged rock and then foundered just south of the Hokianga Harbour. Some of the Ventnor's unusual cargo washed ashore.

OSCA continues to work on the Ventnor project. In late February a group travelled to the Far North to meet with the iwi of the area. We represented the Otago & Southland Branch of the NZCA and travelled with this group. The purpose of this trip was to pay our respects to the dead and to show our appreciation to the local Maori for their care and respect of the remains that had washed ashore. The group was extremely warmly welcomed by the two marae that we visited and heard many amazing stories from the Maori. Most of these stories had been passed down from their grandparents. We were shown areas where the remains had been reburied by the Maori. We also discussed the possibility of a memorial to be laid to remember the story of the Ventnor.

The Ventnor Story and developments will be presented at the NZCA Banana Conference in July later this year.

We would like to thank the Chinese Poll Tax Heritage Trust for contributing towards the costs of this trip.

1902 年 10 月 Ventnor 號船在昌善堂的支持下，離開惠靈頓碼頭，船上裝有不到 5 百個箱子（箱子裡裝的是華僑骸骨並打算運回祖國安葬的）。不幸的是，船觸到了水下的暗礁，最后在 Hokianga Harbour（奧克蘭西南部的赫基昂加海灣）南部沉沒。在 Ventnor 號船上有一些不尋常的箱子，那是用來拋掉以減輕船浮力的。

歐他咭修付崙華聯會還在繼續關注着 Ventnor 這艘船的故事。在二月下旬，一群旅行者準備到北島旅遊並且拜訪了當地的毛利人。我們向華聯會歐他咭修付崙分部提議，和他們一起參加這次旅行。這次行程的主要目的是給當時遇難的人獻上鮮花和敬意，對當地毛利人照看紀念堂表示感激，還有緬懷那些遺留下來的箱子和遺骨。考查人員們受到了毛利人的熱烈歡迎。我們參觀了兩個毛利人的會堂，並且從他們口中聽到了很多不可思議的故事。大多數故事是從老一輩的毛利人那裏傳下來的。他們帶領我們參觀了遺蹟，並且對那些遺留下來的箱子和遺骨進行了新的葬禮。我們還討論了為 Ventnor 號船的遇難建立一個紀念碑，讓大家能夠記住緬懷 Ventnor 號船的故事。

有關 Ventnor 號船的故事和一些進展情況將會在今年 7 月的 NZCA Banana Conference 上展現給大家。

最后，我們對華人人頭稅歷史遺產信託委員會提供這次旅行的費用而表示衷心的感謝。

To the Chinese Community:

With the Dunedin Chinese Garden ("Lan Yuan") completed and officially opened it has now been gifted to the City of Dunedin to be run by the Dunedin City Council ("DCC"). We are very grateful for the valued contribution and continued support of the Chinese community which has enabled this to happen.

The Dunedin Chinese Gardens Trust ("DCGT") has a continuing role to work with the DCC to ensure that the authenticity and integrity of Lan Yuan is maintained as well as assisting with fundraising if required and to encourage membership to the *Friends of the Garden*. The DCGT also considers Lan Yuan will form a strategic element in the development of the future historic Central Otago gold trail.

As a significant tourist attraction the DCGT believes Lan Yuan will play a key role in *enlightening* the local population and visitors on the Chinese role in New Zealand's history and on the Chinese culture in general. This objective forms an integral part of the DCGT's Vision Statement.

The DCGT has entered into a sponsorship agreement with the SBS Bank, whereby the SBS Bank has made a generous donation and significant interest-free loan to the DCGT. The terms of the sponsorship agreement include the SBS writing off the loan once \$10 million of new investment business from DCGT supporters is generated over the two years from June 2008. If this target is not met the Trust is required to meet any outstanding loan balance not written off.

The role of the DCGT is to introduce the SBS Bank to people who may wish to consider the SBS as part of their investment portfolio.

We stress that once introductions by the Trust have been completed any business dealings between you and the SBS Bank are carried out in the strictest of confidence. The Trust receives no information on an individual basis and the only information that the DCGT receives is a monthly balance of the total business generated to date.

Your participation is purely voluntary but obviously we would be most grateful if you did choose to make SBS Bank part of your investment plan. Any business or investment that follows will be recorded by SBS Bank as resulting from the DCGT connection and a portion of the loan written off accordingly.

SBS Bank has attractive rates of investment competitive with other banking organisations and, of course, any monies deposited/invested (up to \$1 million) with the SBS Bank are covered under the Government deposit guarantee scheme. Please note that this notice does not constitute the provision of investment advice.

The agreement has been running for about eleven months to date and already it has generated about **\$5** million of new business.

If you do choose to invest with the SBS Bank or decide to rollover your existing investments please contact Jackie Cooper (phone: 471 4432) at SBS Dunedin and inform her that you are doing so because of the Dunedin Chinese Garden connection.

In Christchurch – Friday 10th to Monday 13th April



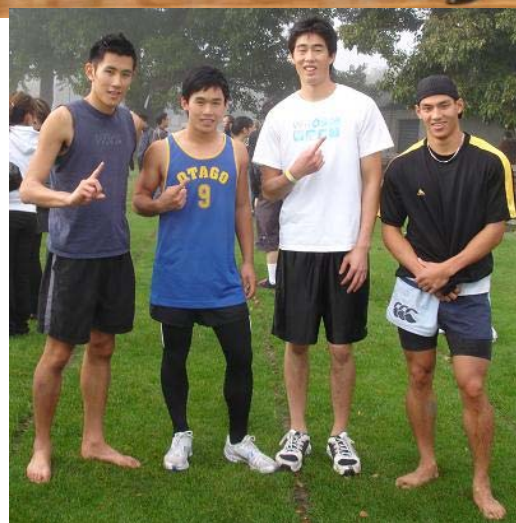

Friday:

The vans started bright and early at 6.30am on the journey to Christchurch for the annual Easter Sports Tournament. The journey was far from uneventful with a five car pile up just 2 car lengths ahead of the vans on the Rakaia Bridge. Whilst OSCA members checked up on those involved and acted as traffic wardens, panic set in for the OSCA Cultural Concert performers who were in a rush to make it on time for their big debut. However, this didn't hold them back. Arriving just in time, Otago and Southland set the standard for the beginning of the tournament by winning all three sections of the Cultural Concert Talent Contest. Jason Wong's entry "180 Seconds" was the winner of the Multimedia section and Gabriel Smith won the Open section with his own Spanish guitar composition. The highlight of the Concert was the OSCA dance group "More than a Wu-man". With a combination of humour, Chinese opera and hip hop, the performers Brittany Wong, Lilian Pang,

Jenny Hu, Patrick Truong and Jono Wu blew the audience away. All won well deserved \$100 cash prizes.

Basketball, Badminton and Touch all got underway shortly after the Opening Ceremony with OSCA teams competing in all these sports. That evening indoor soccer and tennis were contested. There were several



competitive and social entries in the tennis, with the OSCA pairs almost taking a clean sweep of the event and winning the tennis overall. Later that night the social for those 18 and over was held at Café Bleu, giving everyone an opportunity to unwind and start the Easter partying.

Saturday:

There were early starts had by most, with the basketball beginning at 9.00am and continuing until 7pm. There were many closely fought games, with the OSCA Women's Overs team losing by four points to Auckland and the Men's Under 17 team winning a close game against Canterbury in overtime. Running concurrently with basketball was the touch rugby competition. The OSCA team did not do so well and lost all their games. However all the players had a lot of fun on the field. Miniball was also played over the weekend, with the team drawing two games and losing one. Later that evening the indoor netball was played, with OSCA fielding three teams, and two of them making it to the final "Super 6". New Zealand Chinese Association Winter Camp Trip

(Nov- Dec 2008)

This report is written in order of the cities that we visited and outlines the various attractions and personal memories that I can remember from visiting each city. It doesn't include all my memories because that would take far too long to put onto paper. For me, the China Trip was the best and most inspirational trip that I have ever been on. It certainly stirred up emotions when visiting the homes of my ancestors and it helped me to understand and appreciate the good life that I live in New Zealand.



Foshan City: I really enjoyed learning the kung fu routine at the Wong Fei Hong temple. The amount of time spent at the temple was perfect, and the routine learnt sufficiently difficult and complex, yet simple enough for us to learn in three days to perform to the public! The two kung fu masters were helpful, friendly and also very approachable. I enjoyed socialising with them at karaoke on the final night at Energy bar. Watching the other members of the kung fu school perform at their daily performances was also very inspirational.

Zhong Shan City: The visit to the Dr Sun Yat Sen memorial statue and the Dr Sun Yat Sen Memorial Park was a very educational and amazing experience. Prior to the trip, I didn't know the history or significance of this important figure in Chinese history. The statue was huge and the memorial park was equally impressive.

Shenzhen City: The highlight of my visit to Shenzhen city was our visit to the Magnificent China Folklore Park. I didn't realise how large and detailed the park and its exhibits were until I had visited the actual places at a later stage in the trip. It gave me a good rounded view of the geography and culture of China and its people. I was previously unaware of the vast number of different people who make up the people of China. The buildings, structure and scenery never ceased to amaze me. A particular highlight was the flying fox within the park, also the two magnificent shows that we attended during the evening.

Guangzhou City: Guangzhou city was one of the most interesting cities that I visited in China. Its proximity to many of the China Trip participants' ancestral villages, and its sheer size, make this city a definite favourite of mine. The visit to the Guangzhou Memorial Fort and the giant goat statue was hampered by rain, but still was enjoyable. The experience of buying umbrellas, and subsequently getting ripped off by 10 Yuan is still a vivid memory of mine. The cannons outside the Memorial Fort, the huge burial building and the amount of interesting history of Guangzhou and the Guangdong province made the visit a very enjoyable and educational experience.



Visit to Ancestral Villages: I was lucky enough to get to visit 3 of my ancestral villages. At each place, people were there to meet me, or if no one lived there anymore, the ancestral home was located with the help of Janet and local residents. These



visits were an important part of the trip for us growing up as New Zealanders with Chinese heritage. It gave me much satisfaction to have seen the birthplaces of my ancestors and their way of life.

Shanghai: My first impression of Shanghai was that it was so much more advanced than any other part of China that I had visited so far. Shanghai seemed to be full of flash malls. Our visit to the lookout to see the amazing buildings that made up the Shanghai skyline was a definite highlight. The most impressive building was the Oriental Pearl Tower and the Financial Centre Tower. The Oriental Pearl Tower was an amazing sight and the museum underneath was equally impressive with much Shanghai history and wax figurines inside it. Nanjing road was another highlight in Shanghai for those looking to shop. The ancient road on which Nanjing Road is built upon reminds everyone of the history that China has. On



my free day in Shanghai I visited the Shanghai Technology Museum. This was easily the most amazing museum that I have ever visited. It was huge! It covered every area of science and even some that I didn't know existed. It took me a whole day to walk around the museum and even then I didn't have enough time to see and do everything that I wanted to.

Beijing: The Joy City Hotel that we stayed at in Beijing was amazing. It was built for the Beijing Olympics and attached to a large mall full of retail shopping and many food outlets. We didn't need to go anywhere else to go shopping as we had it all right there beside us. One of the highlights of our trip to Beijing was seeing Tiananmen Square, The Forbidden City, The Whispering Wall and the Temple of Heaven. All these sites were within walking distance from each other. We also went to see The Legend of Kung Fu show. This was an amazing show with mind boggling kung fu performances and fight scenes. The Summer Palace was also an amazing place to visit. It was winter when we went to visit and the large manmade lake was frozen solid, which was an amazing sight to see. Shopping in Beijing wouldn't have been complete without a visit to the Silk Markets. Some people went back multiple times to bargain and buy almost anything you could think of. We also had a delicious Peking duck dinner. By far my favourite day of the whole

trip to China was the day that we visited the Great Wall of China, the Ming tombs and the Beijing Olympic stadiums. The Great Wall is the most amazing place that I have ever visited, and the Birds Nest and Water Cube were some of the most amazing buildings that I will ever see.

Hong Kong: In Hong Kong we were allowed to explore the city by ourselves. Most of us split up into smaller groups and explored the seemingly endless number of shopping malls and arcades. Some of us went to HK Disneyland, others went to Macau to gamble and some also went to Ocean Park for some theme park excitement. My favourite places during the Hong Kong visit included visiting Ocean Park, shopping at the largest shopping mall in Hong Kong, Ocean City, and catching the ferry to Macau to look at the Venetian Casino.



Accommodation and Travel: The accommodation in the hotels was good with most hotels being centrally located to shopping malls and eating areas. The highlights were the hotels in Shanghai and Beijing. It took a while to get used to the hard beds in China, but apart from that the accommodation was very comfortable and suited to our tour group's needs. The free internet at most hotels was a definite plus to our accommodation and I would encourage future tour participants to bring a laptop with them so they can keep in contact with the western world! The travel on the tour buses was comfortable, and the bus drivers were always happy and helpful.



Janet/Jessie/Cindy/Sunny: These four people, our guides, were exceptional on this Winter Camp. The amount paid for the trip is very much worth it for the amount of knowledge, guidance and wisdom they have shared. You just cannot put a price on having people like this to show you around a foreign country. China wouldn't have been the same experience without having these four as our guides. All were approachable and very helpful in every aspect of the trip.

Conclusion: This winter camp has been a trip of a lifetime. It was both worthwhile and very eventful. I have made many new friends and learnt many history lessons. It helps me to appreciate where my family has originated from. It is a trip that I would recommend all Chinese New Zealanders' to take part in. Thank you NZCA! 10/10

Thank you Cecil and Nancy! When will you be returning to Dunedin?

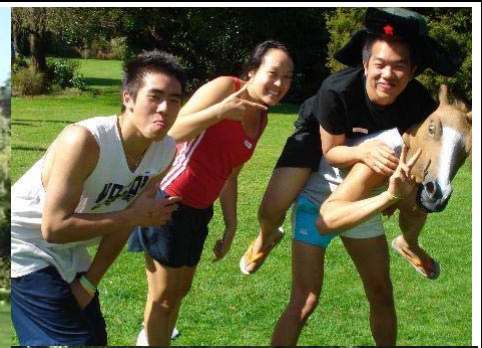


Chinese New Year Picnic 2009

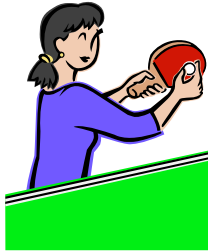
